The effect of World War II on the Jewish populations of Europe

When World War II broke out, the Nazis took over many European countries with large populations of Jewish people. As the Germans advanced into these countries, they executed hundreds of thousands of Jews in mass killings.

In 1942, the Nazis introduced a policy referred to as the 'Final Solution to the Jewish problem'. This was the mass killing of Jewish people in Nazi controlled areas, which became known as the Holocaust. This resulted in the deaths of 6 million Jews and 5 million others viewed as inferior.

The Nazis set up death camps and slave labour camps called concentration camps. People were transported to these camps from the ghettos on trains, and forced to work as labourers (if they were strong enough) or sent to gas chambers where they were killed with poisonous gas and then burned in incinerators.

This was one of the most horrific genocides (organized mass killings of a group) of the 20th Century.

I just couldn't stand by and see people destroyed. I did what I could, what I had to do, what my conscience told me I must do. That's all there is to it."







In 1942, over 100 000 Japanese Americans were removed from their homes and forced into **internment camps** in the USA. 



The Space Race

The USA and USSR both competed to achieve advancements in space exploration. This was called the **space race**. Both sides wanted to prove that their system was superior through this competition and they celebrated their achievements through the use of propaganda.

The USSR launched the first satellite, called Sputnik, into space. This was a spacecraft that orbited the earth and could potentially attack from space. The USSR also sent the first person into space – Yuri Gagarin. These were both major propaganda victories for the USSR.

The USA then pumped huge sums of money into the space race through the organisation NASA. This led to the first mission in which people orbited the moon, and then the first moon landing by US astronauts in 1969. This was a great propaganda victory for the USA.

Why did the USA drop the bombs?

- * Following the first test of a nuclear bomb by the Manhattan Project in New Mexico in July 1945 the USA had to decide whether to use this weapon on Japan to end World War II.
- President Truman decided that he would rather use the bomb on Japan than risk the lives of American soldiers in a land invasion of Japan.
- * The effectiveness of the bomb was not the only reason for using it. There was pressure from scientists who actually wanted to see the weapon in action. And some historians believe it was a message to the USSR to show Stalin that the USA had an extremely powerful weapon that they were willing to use.
- After the USA dropped the bombs on Hiroshima on 6 August 1945 and then Nagasaki on 9 August 1945, the Japanese emperor surrendered and World War II was over.
