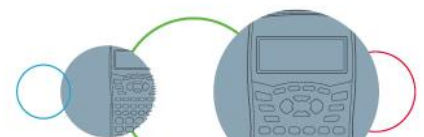

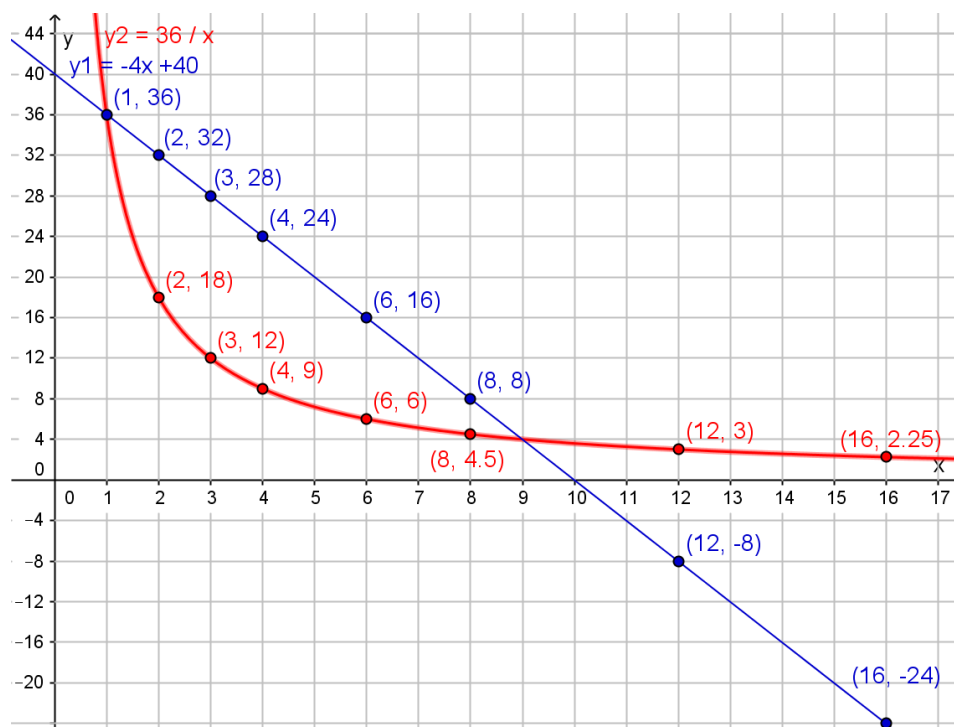

Question 6

6.1. Construct the following without the use of a protractor.

6.1.1. These steps are taken from www.mathsisfun.com (4)

1. Place the compass at one end of line segment.
2. Adjust the compass to slightly longer than half the line segment length.
3. Draw arcs above and below the line.
4. Keeping the same compass width, draw arcs from other end of line.
5. Place ruler where the arcs cross, and draw the line segment.

Marks for: Arcs above and below the line that intersect $\checkmark\checkmark$
 Line segment drawn from the two intersecting arcs \checkmark
 Perpendicular line marked and labelled \checkmark

6.1.2. Steps: (5)

1. Draw a 4cm line. \checkmark
2. Draw an arc with a protractor that measures 4cm from one end of the line. \checkmark
3. Draw a second arc of the same size as the first \checkmark
4. Connect the ends of the first line to the intersection of the two arcs. \checkmark
5. Worked neatly and labelled points \checkmark

$$= 32.99\text{mm} + 10\text{mm} + 21\text{mm} + 8.31\text{mm} + 13\text{mm}$$

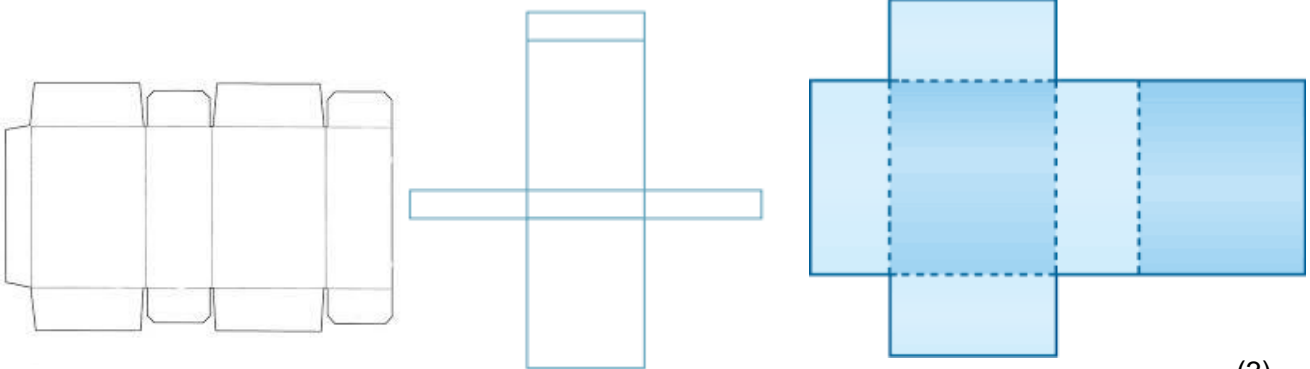

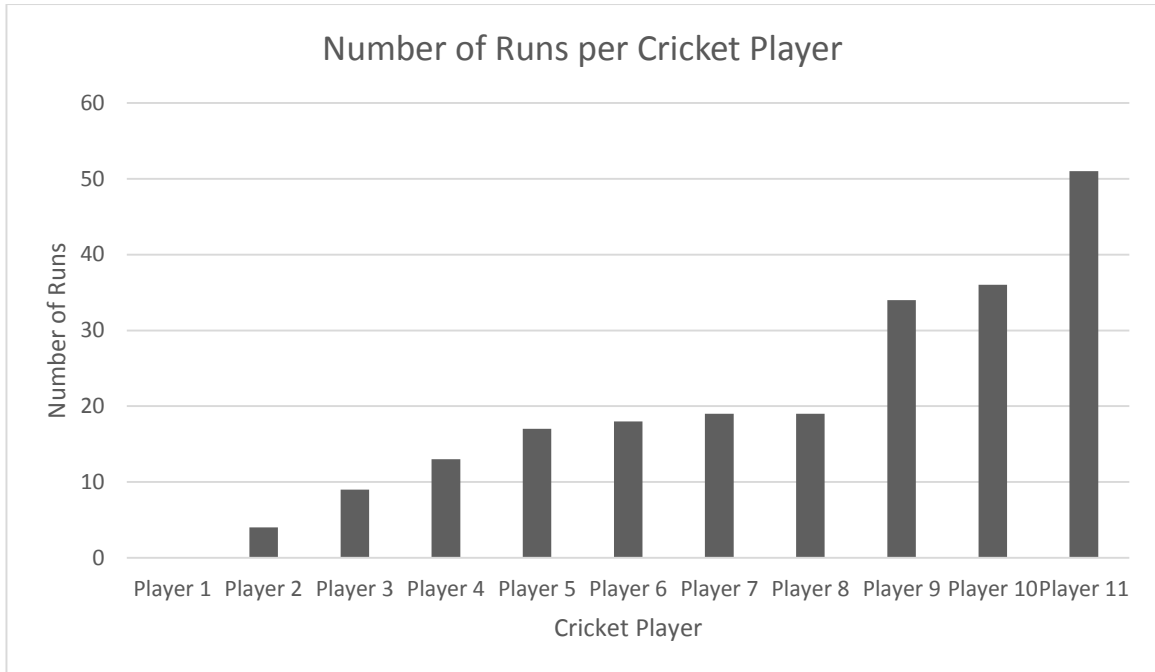
